Dear Mr. Harkins:

The Region 2 Planning Commission (R2PC) on behalf of the Southeast Michigan Prosperity Region 9 (Hillsdale, Jackson, Lenawee, Livingston, Monroe and Washtenaw Counties) is pleased to submit the attached grant application for Governor Snyder's Regional Prosperity Initiative (RPI) funding. As both an existing regional planning commission and the federally designated metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for the Jackson Urbanized area, the R2PC has served as the planning, research, and advisory arm to local units of government since 1973. R2PC has a history of promoting and achieving intergovernmental cooperation, coordination, and collaboration and assisting local units of government in achieving their respective goals, and is pleased to have been part of the prosperity Region 9 leadership effort for the 2014 and 2015 RPI grants.

Prosperity Region 9 partners have made great progress over the last year in working together to develop a common vision for regional prosperity, and evaluating opportunities for increasing collaboration on, or consolidation of services delivery within the region. Working through transportation, industry talent council, work force and adult education functional groups, we completed our initial five-year *Regional Economic Prosperity Strategy* in January, 2015. Our functional teams have developed and implemented "working to learn together" projects which helped establish a common understanding of needs and issues; identified models for collaboration and/or consolidation; and improved coordination among regional organizations. We look forward to continuing to work together in 2016.

In year 3, proposed RPI funds will be used by regional partners to (1) expand the engagement of our business partners in developing a long-term talent pool by improving career opportunity awareness and establishing common career pathways; (2) strengthen the integration of transportation and land use planning; (3) establish and implement a unified brand for Region 9; and (4) expand and strengthen the outreach and engagement of Region 9 stakeholders in the implementation of the five year Prosperity Strategy. In addition, grant funds will be used to review and update the high-priority actions identified in the five-year *Regional Economic Prosperity Strategy* through ongoing work of the functional teams.

We appreciate the opportunity to apply for these important RPI grant funds and are dedicated to moving forward on our vision for regional economic prosperity.

Question 1: The Region 9 (R9) partners are applying to continue work in Tier 1, although we have progressed toward Tier 2, including the consolidation of three of the region's Michigan Works! Agencies and workforce development boards (the new Southeast Michigan Consortium); shared funding and work among the Greater Ann Arbor Region economic development partners; research on best practices of regional collaboration partnerships; and region-wide stakeholder discussions on what type of organization structure best fits Region 9. In 2016, the region will continue bringing together public, private, and nonprofit regional partners to evaluate and create a formal framework (and related agreements) to become a regional council.

Question 2: The group of stakeholders engaged in the R9 prosperity initiative has grown this year to over 110 businesses, public, education, and nonprofit organizations (up from about 80 organizations last year). In 2016, we will continue to build this partnership, including the addition of new regional partners, such as the Hillsdale, Jackson, and Lenawee County Community Action Agency, Oakland Livingston Human Service Agency, and the Monroe County Opportunity Program. We have attached letters of support from many of our partners (including all required partners), and a complete list of stakeholders is available on our <u>website</u>.

Question 3: The proposed scope of work for 2016 includes work on five major areas that advance the goals of the *Region 9 Five-year Prosperity Strategy*. Region 9's proposed budget for these activities is \$318,300. This includes a \$243,300 request as a regional collaborative and an additional \$75,000 for the feasibility study to move toward a regional council. Budget amounts are identified for each task below and Appendix A provides a comprehensive budget and timeline.

1. Expanding and deepening the engagement of business partners in talent pipeline development (\$75,000; high priority). A subcommittee of industry, government, education, and nonprofit organizations will develop and build on existing programs to connect business and community partners with middle- and high-school students to help understand career opportunities in, and training needs for, advanced manufacturing and autonomous vehicle industries. These industries, particularly the emerging autonomous vehicle industry, offer significant opportunities to engage with business and education partners to address some of the emerging talent needs. The subcommittee will identify priority actions (such as offering reverse career fairs or apprenticeships), establish metrics of success for these programs, and conduct an end-of-year review on successes and challenges. The work will incorporate data collected by the Workforce Intelligence Network (who will be represented on the subcommittee), and utilize updated regional branding and outreach materials (see item C below) (\$35,000; high priority; Q1 TO Q3).

Prosperity initiative grant funds will also be used to help accelerate the success of the MI Bright Future pilot effort underway in Livingston County and expand its use to Monroe and Hillsdale Counties. This will include hands-on assistance to schools and businesses to get them engaged and interested in the program and drive participation among both partners (\$38,000; medium priority; Q1 TO Q3).

Finally, the R9 management team will reach out to the Prosperity Regions 6 and 10 to convene a joint meeting of our leadership teams, as well as other relevant stakeholders (e.g., MichAuto) to discuss the supply chain, labor needs, and potential transportation-land use impacts (see item B below) of the emerging autonomous vehicle/connected vehicle industry and identify key actions steps the regions could take together to help address opportunities (\$2,000; medium/low priority; Q1).

2. Transportation and land use. In 2015, regional partners completed an excellent study on how transportation issues are affecting access and retention of jobs in the region. The study found that transportation is a very significant part of the talent puzzle, and that there are many unmet needs. As a follow-up to this work, partners will map regional transportation options (e.g., public transit, on-demand services, rail, nonmotorized) options throughout the region. The data will be used to conduct a gap analysis of how well the region's current transportation meets the workforce needs identified by businesses and workers in the 2015 study, and what, if any, access issues the region should make a priority (\$47,000; high priority; Q1 and Q2).

In addition, partners will evaluate the land use policy impacts associated with emerging autonomous/connected vehicle industry. This industry could bring many job, economic development, and quality of life benefits to the region. There are also potentially significant land use and other policy impacts that this region (and others) will need to consider in coming years. Issues around safety (e.g., pedestrian-auto interactions), parking, funding, maintenance, and connections to other forms of transportation such as public transit will need to be considered as regional partners update transportation and land use plans. Regional partners will form a workgroup to identify key policy questions and issues, and work with academic and private sector partners to conduct research on some of the potential policy implications. The workgroup will make recommendations regarding how regional partners can integrate potential policy options into land use and transportation plans and how the region can serve as a voice for potential state policy changes that may be required (\$23,000; medium priority; Q2 to Q4).

- 3. Unified voice and brand. At our November 2015 prosperity summit, regional partners identified the importance of having a unified voice and brand for the region. The six-county economic development organizations established and having been working under the Greater Ann Arbor Region brand in their efforts to attract and retain business (http://greaterannarborregion.org/). When this brand was established, there was significant discussion regarding the benefits and drawbacks. In 2016, we will build on these discussions and work with stakeholders across the region to get input and consensus on a unified vision and brand. Once we have agreement within the region, we will update R9 prosperity initiative materials to reflect the new brand (\$11,000; high priority; Q1 to Q2).
- 4. Complete a feasibility study and action plan for moving to the Regional Council tier. In 2015, regional partners conducted research on successful regional economic prosperity/collaboration models to understand key elements of success, challenges, necessary stakeholders, and benefits and drawbacks of various collaboration structures (see accomplishments section). In 2016, we will continue building on this effort and complete a

feasibility analysis and action plan for moving to a regional council structure as defined by DTMB. Based on the discussion at our recent Prosperity Summit, the R9 coordinator will finalize research on applicable models and make initial recommendations regarding potential council structure. We will convene a regional meeting in the second quarter to further discuss the regional council model and refine the recommendations and action plan. The results will be shared with regional stakeholders, and the RPI coordinator and management team will meet individually with County Boards of Commissioners to discuss key options and elements. After getting input and agreement in concept among the six counties, the RPI coordinator will summarize recommended options and convene a workgroup of management team members and other regional leaders that will draft relevant organizational agreements (\$75,000; high priority; Q1 to Q4).

5. Communications and engagement strategy. In 2016, we will expand the scope and frequency of our outreach efforts. First, we will develop a communications and engagement strategy that defines key messages about the region and the initiative, who to disseminate information to, what types of information they need, and how they prefer to receive it. Based on the results of the new communication strategy and voice/branding discussions, the RPI coordinator will make updates to and create new communication pieces and mechanisms, such as newsletters and an updated website (\$17,000; high priority; Q1 and ongoing).

In addition, regional partners will host a networking event to update partners on progress, provide information on emerging regional issues, identify priority prosperity issues to include in the next prosperity strategy update, and provide opportunities for regional partners to connect on issues of mutual concerns and continue building relationships (\$9,500; high/medium priority; Q3).

Finally, the management team and the RPI Coordinator will continue to reach out to and meet ad hoc with regional organizations who have not yet engaged in the RPI effort but who could serve as partners moving forward. The purpose will be to help them understand what the R9 Prosperity Initiative is, how it relates to their organization's mission, and identify ways these partners would like to be involved with the RPI effort (\$3,000; medium priority; Q1 to Q4).

In order to move forward on these initiatives, regional partners will once again work with Region 2 Planning Commission staff and a regional prosperity initiative coordinator to move forward on the implementation of the R9 Prosperity Initiative (\$57,800; high priority; Q1 to Q4).

2. DEMONSTRATION OF SUCCESS: Please illustrate how collaborative planning has led to meaningful action. Define success for your region and explain your method for measuring it. The region has made significant progress in achieving the objectives we identified as priorities in 2015. We recently created a fantastic video on the R9 Prosperity Initiative that highlights some of the regional collaboration's successes and benefits. The video was shown as part of a recent regional summit, and will be shared with regional partners on an ongoing basis in order to help engage stakeholders. (Available at:

There have been many key accomplishments in 2015. To date, the region has:

- Consolidated Washtenaw, Livingston, and South Central Michigan Works! Agencies into the
 newly established Southeast Michigan Consortium. Partners led by a team of elected
 officials, business leaders, and workforce development representatives created a PA-7
 agreement, identified members of a new consortium board and workforce development
 board, and created operating bylaws for those organizations. The PA-7 agreement was
 approved by Gov. Rick Snyder in September, 2015, and partners are continuing to work
 together to transition to the new organization.
- Developed a <u>Southeast Michigan Prosperity Region 9: Regional Workforce Alignment Plan</u>, which leveraged federal Department of Labor funding to help the region prepare for meeting Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act requirements. The plan¹identifies four key areas of service alignment among the (then) four Michigan Works! Agencies in the region. Even with the consolidation of the Livingston, Washtenaw and South Central agencies, the service alignment plan still lays out tangible and specific objectives for how the (now) two workforce agencies will work together to improve service delivery.

- Researched different models of regional structures/frameworks that have been used to advance regional prosperity in other parts of the country. Models examined included the Allegheny Conference, Greater Minneapolis-St. Paul, Northeast Ohio (Team NEO and Fund our Future), Grand Vision/Northwest Michigan, and East Bay Economic Development Alliance (northern California). Our prosperity region coordinator summarized the initial findings from Region 9 and used the research to identify key questions for partners regarding potential models of formal collaboration and/or consolidation of services. The research also helped identify regional leaders to participate as panelists at our recent Prosperity Summit, and is being used to develop an action plan for next steps in establishing a more formal regional implementation structure.
- Hosted the Regional Prosperity Summit in November 2015, which focused on discussing models and options for the establishment of a more formal regional implementation structure (e.g., Council) and identify priority goal and action items for the 2016 workplan. At the summit, regional partners heard about best practices for regional collaboration and consolidation from other regions, provided input (through an interactive polling activity) on the most desired elements for a future regional council/implementation structure, and worked in groups to identify specific actions for advancing the Region 9 Five-year Prosperity Strategy.
- Completed the Working to Learn project that evaluated how transportation impacts the
 ability of workers to seek and retain jobs and/or job training. The project included
 interviews with over a dozen industry leaders, over 400 Michigan Works! clients, and
 Michigan Works! staff to identify when and how transportation limits job placement and
 retention, what types of services Michigan Works! agencies are using to help address
 transportation gaps, and what employers see as key transportation needs in the region. The
 study found that:
 - Transportation is strongly connected to finding and maintaining employment
 - A significant share of Michigan Works! support service funding goes to help with transportation needs
 - Additional transportation options (such as transit) are needed
 - Business leaders see opportunities for engaging on worker transportation issues

- Hosted two regional stakeholder webinars that highlighted the regional transportation and workforce project as well as the workforce service alignment and consolidation efforts.
 Over 50 people participated in the two webinars.
- Established a challenge grant program to support the implementation of some of the most strongly supported and timely strategies included in the Region 9 Five-year Prosperity Strategy. We developed and issued a request for proposals to regional partners, which required a 1:1 match of grant and leveraged dollars. Seven projects were funded through the challenge grant process in September and are just getting underway on their proposed work.

- Held monthly management team meetings/conference calls to check in on project progress, discuss upcoming tasks and respond to stakeholder questions, and identify opportunities.
- Made presentations to the Washtenaw County and Lenawee County Boards of Commissioners on the regional prosperity initiative and progress to date on the workforce consolidation efforts.
- 3. APPLYING LESSONS LEARNED: What lessons will you take from last year's grant award? What are the most significant challenges to the region's collaborative success in for the coming year? How can the region's previous work and a renewed Regional Prosperity Grant inform a strategy for the upcoming year and increase opportunities for success?

One of the key lessons learned from last year is that it is challenging to get strong engagement among stakeholders unless there is a focus on a clear and targeted objective or project. We had enormous success in quickly moving forward on the workforce service alignment and consolidation because we brought stakeholders together with a specific charge and used a rigorous process to facilitate and move the discussion. We had less success garnering interest in participation for ongoing functional team meetings; by late spring, we shifted gears to do webinars and project-specific meetings around transportation and workforce.

We also learned that pushing forward to establish a regional council has required patience and a slightly slower process. It required some research to help regional stakeholders understand the value proposition of more formal regional collaboration. In 2016, we will be moving ahead on an action plan and framework for a more formalized structure, but this will require some continued conversation of what regional partners are willing to give to this effort and what they hope to get from it. We were able to gather some great feedback on the types of structures that stakeholders feel will help in implementing the prosperity strategy, and this information will be used in making recommendations for formal agreements.

The R9 partners have made significant progress in advancing regional prosperity and implementing the *Region 9 Five-year Prosperity Strategy*. We have several efforts underway that we hope to continue building on (e.g., connecting transportation to workforce needs), and have identified several new activity areas that are key to making progress in achieving the goals identified in our strategy. An additional year of funding is critical to identify additional areas that support economic prosperity (such as housing and community services improvements) and continue making progress in implementing the strategy and establishing a regional council.


