- **II.** Pledge of Allegiance Those in attendance rose and joined in the Pledge of Allegiance.
- **III. Approval of the Agenda** The motion was made by Comm. Dotterweich, and supported by Comm. Polaczyk, to approve the March 10, 2016 agenda as presented. The motion carried unanimously.
- **IV. Public Comment** Vice-Chair Tillotson requested public comment. No public comment was received.
- V. Approval of Minutes of the January 14, 2016 Full Commission Meeting A motion was made by Comm. Shotwell, supported by Comm. Jancek, to approve the January 14, 2016 Full Commission minutes as presented. The motion carried unanimously.
- VI. Approval of Action Taken at the February 11, 2016 Executive Committee Meeting A motion was made by Comm. Dotterweich, and supported by Comm. Polaczyk, to approve the action taken at the February 11, 2016 Executive Committee meeting. The motion carried unanimously.
- VII. Receipt of Treasurer's Report of February 29, 2016 A motion was made by Comm. Dotterweich, and supported by Comm. Hayes, to receive the February 29, 2016 Treasurer's Report as presented. The motion carried unanimously.
- **VIII. Approval of March 10, 2016 Submitted Bills** A motion was made by Comm. Johnson, and supported by Comm. Hayes, to approve payment of the March, 2016 submitted bills. The motion carried unanimously.
- IX. Staff Progress Report for February, 2016 The February, 2016 staff progress report was included in the agenda packet for Commission review. Mr. Duke reported that RFPs had been prepared to solicit professional services and mini-grant projects for the 2016 RPI grant cycle; staff is working with Grass Lake Township to determine the feasibility of applying for a TAP grant to develop a non-motorized trail between Grass Lake and Chelsea; a draft FY 2017-2020 TIP project list was developed and presented to the JACTS committees; staff completed a recreation plan for Leoni Twp. and is working on developing Master Plan updates for the City of Litchfield, Grass Lake Twp., Liberty Twp., Norvell Twp., and the Village of Britton. Both the Lenawee and Jackson County Solid Waste Plan amendments are currently out for the 90-day public comment period.
- X. Approval of the R2PC FY 2015 Audit Mr. William Tucker, Abraham & Gaffney, P.C., presented a PowerPoint summarizing the findings of the R2PC FY 2015 annual audit. A motion was made by Comm. Dotterweich, supported by Comm. Shotwell, to receive the 2015 audit as presented and place it on file. The motion carried unanimously.
- XI. Election of the 2016 Personnel & Finance Committee Mr. Duke explained that the R2PC Full Commission annually appoints a Personnel & Finance Committee at the March meeting. The committee is comprised of the Commission Chair and Treasurer plus a minimum of 5 R2PC Commissioners. A motion was made by Comm. Dotterweich, supported by Comm. Shotwell, to retain Comm. Dotterweich, Comm. Gaede, and Comm. Tillotson

- on the P & F Committee and to nominate Commrs. Hayes and Duckham to fill the existing vacancies. The motion carried unanimously.
- **XII. R2PC New Website Orientation** Mr. Aaron Dawson presented an overview of the R2PC's new website showing the Commissioners how to navigate among the various subjects listed on the site.
- XIII. Update on the 2016 Regional Prosperity Initiative Mr. Duke reported that RFPs had been prepared to solicit program management services and challenge grants for the 2016 RPI. The RFPs are currently under review by the Management Team members and will be released over the next week or so.
- XIV. Opportunity for Public Comment Approval of Amendments to the JACTS FY 2014-2017 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Mr. Duke reported that MDOT was proposing the following amendments to the JACTS FY 2014-2017 TIP:
 - ADD FY 2016 (JN 129398) US-127/US-223 (3 structures in Jackson and Lenawee counties): consultant bridge scoping. Early PE. FED \$40,925 / State \$9,075
 - ADD FY 2016 (JN 129415) I-94 (M-60 to Sargent Road): install freeway delineation. CONSTRUCTION. State \$43,651

The motion was made by Comm. Beeker, supported by Comm. Jancek, to approve the MDOT amendments to the JACTS FY 2014-2017 TIP as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

- III. **Approval of the Agenda** The motion was made by Comm. Polaczyk, supported by Comm. Hayes, to approve the April 14, 2016 Executive Committee agenda as present-

- ed. The motion carried unanimously.
- IV. Public Comment Teresa Canine spoke on her efforts to get the Moon Lake Road bridge in Jackson County reconstructed. She reviewed the deteriorating condition of the bridge and safety concerns for both motorists and boaters.
 - No additional public comments were received.
- V. Approval of Minutes of the February 11, 2016 Executive Committee Meeting A motion was made by Comm. Duckham, supported by Comm. Knoblauch, to approve the February 11, 2016 Executive Committee meeting minutes as presented. The motion carried unanimously.
- VI. Receipt of the Treasurer's Report of March 31, 2016 A motion was made by Comm. Polaczyk, supported by Comm. Hayes, to receive the March 31, 2016 Treasurer's Report as submitted. The motion carried unanimously.
- VII. **Approval of the April 14, 2016 Submitted Bills** A motion was made by Comm. Knoblauch, supported by Comm. Polaczyk, to approve payment of the April 14, 2016 submitted bills as presented. The motion carried unanimously.
- VIII. **Staff Progress Report for March 2016** The staff progress report was included in the agenda packet for Committee review.
- IX. **Michigan Avenue Reconstruction Update –** Mr. Pittman and Mr. Grazioli, MDOT-Jackson TSC, gave a PowerPoint presentation illustrating traffic circulation changes planned for Louis Glick Hwy and Washington Avenue included with the proposed reconstruction of W. Michigan Avenue in FY 2017. Mr. Pittman explained that the project will involve ROW acquisition from more than 100 properties. The \$4 million project will convert Glick and Washington from one-way to two-way traffic and will improve motorists' accessibility to the Jackson downtown area.
- X. "Opportunity for Public Comment" Approval of Proposed Amendments to the JACTS FY 2014-2017 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) – Chair Rice explained that MDOT was seeking approval of seven (7) amendments to the JACTS FY 2014-2017 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). A motion was made by Comm. Polaczyk, supported by Comm. Duckham, to approve the MDOT amendments as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

XI. Region 9 Prosperity Initiative RFPs – Award of the Management and Technical Assistance Grants – Mr. Duke distributed a memorandum summarizing the process implemented by staff to solicit proposals for RPI management services for 2016. The request for Proposals (RFP) were distributed to more than 25 consulting agencies in the Region 9 planning area and was also posted on the R2PC website. The RPI Management Team met on April 11th to review the proposals received and to make a recommendation to the R2PC for the selection of Public Sector Consultants, Inc.

The motion was made by Comm. Hayes, supported by Comm. Burtch, to concur with the recommendation of the RPI Management Team in the selection of Public Sector Consultants, Inc. to perform grant management services for 2016. The motion carried unanimously.

XII. Approval of the Resolution Certifying the Jackson Urbanized Area Planning Process for FY 2017 – A motion was made by Comm. Duckham, supported by Comm. Polaczyk, to approve the resolution (included in the agenda packet) certifying the Jackson Urbanized Area Planning process for Fiscal Year 2017. The motion carried unanimously.

- XIII. MDOT Call for Projects FY 2017 High Risk Rural Roads Projects Mr. Duke reported that the Michigan Department of Transportation has issued a call for FY 2017 High Risk Rural Road project applications. The projects must be located outside an urbanized area and may include such improvements as signage, rumble strips, traffic signal optimization, bridge railing replacement, and pedestrian crossings. Applications must be submitted to MDOT by April 29th.
- XIV. Approve Updates to the R2PC ICMA Retirement Plan Mr. Duke explained that the IRS is requiring agencies enrolled in the ICMA-RC retirement program to restate, and amend if necessary, their Governmental Money Purchase Plan & Trust Document by April 30, 2016. Mr. Duke stated that the R2PC attorney is reviewing and preparing the document for submission which restates employer/employee contributions to the ICMA retirement program initiated in 2007. Mr. Duke distributed a sample resolution to be signed by the Chair and submitted with the restated ICMA retirement program document.

The motion was made by Comm. Hayes, supported by Comm. Burtch, authorizing the Chair to sign the resolution approving R2PC compliance with submitting a restated ICMA-RC Governmental Money Purchase Plan & Trust Document. The motion carried unanimously.

XV. Federal Project Reviews

- a. The motion was made by Comm. Duckham, supported by Comm. Polaczyk, to recess the Executive Committee and convene the Review Committee. The motion carried unanimously.
- b. The Committee reviewed federal project applications submitted by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and by the Community Action Agency for Head Start/Early Head Start programs in Jackson and Hillsdale counties. No comments were received.
- c. The motion was made by Comm. Duckham, supported by Comm. Polaczyk to recess the Review Committee the reconvene the Executive Committee. The motion carried unanimously.
- XVI. Other Business Comm. Gaede requested a list of the CMAQ projects selected for Lenawee County for FY 2017-2020. No other business was brought before the Committee.
- XVII. **Public Comment** No public comments were received. Chair Rice requested that a Commissioners comment agenda item be added to future agendas.
- XVIII. **Adjournment** There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned by Chair Rice at 2:57 PM.

Area-Wide Regional Planning Activities

Economic Development

- Staff attended the monthly meetings of the City of Jackson DDA committee.
- Staff attended a Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) meeting on April 28th regarding potential Target Market Analysis (TMA) housing studies in interested municipalities in the counties of Hillsdale and Lenawee.

Regional Prosperity Initiative Update

Staff prepared a series of RFPs to solicit coordinator/facilitator services, technical support, and challenge grants for the upcoming year. A list of potential consultants was prepared and staff distributed copies of the RFPs and requested that completed proposals be returned to the R2PC by April 6th. The bids were reviewed by the RPI Management Team and a recommendation was made to R2PC for the selection of PSC, Inc. to provide managerial services for the 2016 grant. The R2PC concurred with the Management Team recommendation and authorized staff to enter into a contract with PSC, Inc. A FY 2016 kick-off Management Team meeting was held on April 29th to discuss when to send out the RFPs for the Challenge grants and if funding set aside for technical services should be shifted to the challenge grant program.

Training

- Staff attended the Michigan Association of Planning's Spring Institute on April 14th and received needed continuing education credits to maintain AICP (American Institute of Certified Planners) certification.
- Staff attended the Michigan Association of Planning Annual conference held in Phoenix, AZ.

Staff prepared the April, 2016 R2PC agenda packet.

Regional Transportation Planning Hillsdale, Jackson, and Lenawee Counties

Assistance to Local Governments

- Staff updated the Transportation Economic Development Map that is required for utilizing Category D funds.
- Staff is reviewing the new operating guidelines for the rural task forces.
- Staff attended training for Asset Management Strategies, Roadsoft Software, and various webinars for regional transportation issues.
- Staff completed a purpose and need study to determine if Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) grant funding for a non-motorized trail from Grass Lake Township to Chelsea is available. Funding availability is still being determined. Jackson and Washtenaw County Road Commissions are willing to administer the project. An engineer's estimate has been prepared and staff will meet to discuss financials with Grass Lake Township. A representative from Washtenaw County is attending a state trails meeting to assess TAP grant viability. Staff is working to determine if Recreational Trail Program funding will be available to use toward local match and if Rails-With-Trails is a program that has been used in Michigan.
- Staff submitted Congestion Mitigation Air Quality program information for Lenawee County to MDOT.
- Staff attended PASER rating training in Kalamazoo, MI. This training is required to collect pavement condition data for the Transportation Asset Management Council. In addition, staff attended the TAMC Webinar to better prepare for Asset Management data collection.
- Staff attended the Small Urban Program meetings for Albion/Marshall, Adrian/Tecumseh, and Hillsdale/Jonesville.
- Staff received updated funding amounts for the Rural Task Force program and will be assisting the Task Force members in programming the increased revenue for FY 2016.
- Staff attended the Michigan Association of Regions meeting in Lansing.
- Staff attended the TAMC Spring Conference in Detroit.
- Staff attended several webinars and conference calls, for training in aging populations, freight performance measures, and other transportation topics.
- Staff attended the 1st annual Bike and Pedestrian safety conference.

The development of a new non-motorized plan is now a high priority of the WCC, and they will be working with R2PC and AARP representatives to move forward.

Program Management

- Staff attended the monthly directors' meeting of the Michigan Transportation Planning Association.
- Staff conducted the monthly meetings of the JACTS Technical Advisory and Policy committees.
- Staff prepared the quarterly progress report and billing for MDOT approval.
- Staff attended the JATA Local Transportation Advisory Council (LTAC) meeting.
- Staff began a Continuation of Operations Plan (COOP) for JACTS.
- Staff completed an application for \$100,000 in 5303 Transit Planning funds for Jackson Area Transportation Authority to complete an accessibility and organization plan. Staff also attended the JATA Board meeting to inform the Board about the local match if applicable.
- Staff attended a non-motorized planning meeting to determine how funding will be applied.

Long Range Transportation Plan

Staff attended a meeting with MDOT transportation network modelling staff to discuss the upcoming Long Range Transportation Plan update.

Unified Work Program (UWP)

Staff attended the Pre-UWP meeting in Lansing. This is a meeting to determine the priorities for next fiscal year's Unified Work Program in cooperation with MDOT. Staff began the process of preparing the FY 2017 UWP and budget.

Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

- A draft FY 2017-2020 project list was developed and presented to the JACTS committees and the R2PC. An updated project list was presented at the January meetings. TIP development is ongoing, and we are seeking resolutions of support from JATA and Jackson County DOT.
- Staff processed numerous amendments to the JACTS FY 2014-2017 TIP and forwarded the information to MDOT for approval.
- Staff began reviewing the FY 2014-2017 TIP full document, and noting areas for improvement or changes to be implemented in the new cycle.

Jackson Traffic Safety Program

- Staff participated in Office of Highway Safety Planning webinar regarding changes to the MAGIC+ system which tracks enforcement and payments.
- Staff prepared agenda, attended and compiled minutes of the regularly scheduled Jackson Traffic Safety Program meeting.
- Staff submitted March and April impaired driving and seat belt patrols in the OHSP data base.
- Staff submitted the 2nd quarterly progress report to OHSP.

 Staff began updating the JTSP bylaws to pattern other Jackson County Board of Commissioners committees.

Acquisition of land, building and equipment comprising a community hospital

Project Description:

Headwaters Health Foundation (HHF) is a corporate affiliate of Hillsdale Community Health Center (HCHC) d/b/a Hillsdale Hospital. Both HHF and HCHC are organized as Michigan non-profit corporations. HHF will use the Community Facilities Direct Loan (the CF Loan) for which it has submitted a pre-application to finance the acquisition of HCHC's hospital facility (the Hospital Facility) and certain equipment (the Acquisition). In connection with the Acquisition, HHF will enter into an agreement with HCHC (the Operating Agreement) under which HHF will acquire, finance, own, construct, renovate, equip and maintain the Hospital Facility and will contract with HCHC for all operations of the Hospital Facility. HCHC will continue to hold the licenses, agreements with Medicare, Medicaid, Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan and other third-party payors, and contracts with vendors, physicians and others in connection with the operation of the Hospital Facility. Amounts payable by HCHC to HHF under the Operating Agreement will be scheduled to be sufficient to enable HHF to pay debt service on the CF Loan in a timely manner. To secure its payment obligations under the CF Loan, HHF will grant a first mortgage lien on the Hospital Facility in favor of USDA Rural Development.

Project Relationships:

Hillsdale Community Health Center (HCHC), the seller of the Hospital Facility to Headwaters Health Foundation (HHF), will remain the operator. HHF and HCHC are under the control of local governing boards having the same membership. Ownership of the Hospital Facility by HHF and operation of the Hospital Facility by HCHC are their respective core activities. These activities will be undertaken in a coordinated manner through the common governance and management of the two companies.



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


